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There’s also a storyline in which the teenage Cher ends up being attracted to her college-aged ex-step-brother Josh (Paul Rudd), which hasn’t necessarily aged well. And let’s see what — other than cynicism, angst, ripped jeans and grunge music — defined the disaffected generation that gave us Winona Ryder, Ethan Hawke, Julie Delpy and Keanu Reeves. Also, Hulu recently adapted this story in the form of a TV show set in current-day Brooklyn starring Zoe Kravitz as Rob. John Cusack plays Rob, the heartbroken owner of an independent record store in Chicago, Kravitz’s real-life mom, Lisa Bonet, played a role in the original movie. Ben Stiller, who also directed the movie, plays Michael, a convertible-driving yuppie who works at an MTV-like TV station. Not for nothing, Gen X has been accused of skewing white and straight and of overrepresenting white, college-educated twenty-somethings.
